
Thankfulness, faithfulness and generosity were the feelings that arose at this year's annual con-

vention, said CSS W/ELCA President Alice Burnett. "Our annual gathering of our sisters in Christ is always uplifting and joyful. This year we were reminded that we are wonderfully made, loved and blessed by God."

The 32nd convention was held Aug. 16-18 at Holiday Inn I-35 in Wichita. President Burnett welcomed 110 participants which represented more than a 45 percent increase in atten-

dance from last vear's convention.

about the ELCA and its future. "We are a people of hope. We are a community of disciples called to connect with each other and the world."

The Lutheran church made a bold statement at an ELCA church-wide assembly earlier this year by announcing it is a "sanctuary denomination".

"This was a bold statement because it shows we are more concerned about justice, grace and mercy rather than the institution of the church," Rev. Candea said.

"We are willing to take a risk. We don't have to agree. But we should embrace diversity in a bold way," she added.

The Rev. Susan Candea is a member of Atonement Lutheran, Overland Park, KS, where she will be installed as Bishop, October 20, 2019.

Elections held for board, Triennial voting members

Your generosity counts!

The total of the Love Offering gifted on Friday evening was \$1,986.80. The offering will be shared, with 50% going to our church-wide organization (CWO), 25% to MOSAIC and 25% to Lions International in Wichita, KS.

The two agencies also will receive one-half of the \$325 received as in-kind cash donations. With contributions that had been received prior to the convention, MOSAIC and Lions Clubs in Wichita each will receive a check of a total sum of \$696.70.

The estimated value of the personal hygiene and paper items brought to benefit MOSAIC was \$715 and 356 pairs of previously-worn eye glasses were donated to the Lions.

The basket 'silent' auction was quite successful this year with 30 baskets contributed. Including contributions received prior to the convention, \$1,388 will be transferred to the Barbara Nelson Fund invested with the ELCA's Mission Investment Fund. This fund will be called on during 2020 as its purpose is to provide scholarships for individuals to attend Triennial gatherings.

The offering received at the Sunday morning worship service totaled \$1,277. The board had designated 50% of that total to be given to our CWO and 50% to our Education Scholarship Fund used to provide scholarships to women in the Central States Synod seeking post-secondary education.

Along with this offering, and funds received from the 'little' miscellaneous raffle and purchase of Mary Liby's 'card kits', plus offering gifts received prior to the convention, \$1,591.50 will benefit the Education Scholarship Fund.

Thank you to our president, Alice Burnett, who through her delightful storytelling at the Saturday evening banquet raised awareness of the longtime dedication of Lutheran women. She urged each of us to recognize our daily blessings by giving an 'offering of thanks'. A spontaneous 'noisy offering' resulted in \$100.48 that will be sent to the CWO and designated for Thankofferings. These funds support ongoing ministries, including the triennial conventions, the work of their board, the

annual conference of synod presidents, communication ministries, and justice and advocacy work.

Through the generosity of Nadine James of St. Marks Lutheran in Emporia, we were able to have a beautiful quilt to raffle in recognition of the 50th anniversary of ordination of women in the ELCA. A gift of \$294 will be made to the Central States Synod Seminary Education Fund specifying that it be given to female candidates.

The final financial picture of the convention has not been completed. However, it appears there will be an excess of revenue over expenses. Be a mentor to younger Lutheran church women — Mary Liby

There is a common misconception among Lutheran churches that a W/ELCA unit must be formally organized and have officers and/or business meetings. But, W/ELCA does not have to be standardized. W/ELCA simply is a community of women who get together in service to benefit others, said Joy Michalicek church-wide representative at the Friday night session. It does not matter whether a group is large or small, or whether the ladies are serving funeral dinners or hosting a large fundraiser. Each gathering of women, regardless of its size or purpose, is a W/ELCA unit because its members are disciples of Christ joining together to help others.

Michalicek used humor and down-to-earth advice as she encouraged W/ELCA ladies to be mentors to younger women. "Invite them to an event and sit with them in

sion work. SFMM helps refugees resettle and build lives in Wichita by providing essential support to refugees approved through the U.S. Department of State's Resettlement Program. Most of the clients resettled in Wichita are from the Congo, Eritrea, and Burma. Many of these families have lived in refugee camps for up to 18 years waiting for approval of their eligibility status by Homeland Security.

Some of the resettlement services, provided in the first few months by local agencies partnering with Lutheran congregations, support these refugee families with housing, employment skills, job placement, English language learning, financial assistance, clothing, health screenings, and cultural and community orientation.

The Stars for Our Troops service project

at the convention was hosted by Evelyn Clark and her sisters from Resurrection Lutheran Church in Haysville, Kansas. It was a fun and meaningful way to recycle retired American flags and honor veterans.

Participants made mementoes for veterans using stars from retired American flags obtained from local VFW chapters. Prior to convention, the stars were carefully cut out of the blue field of each flag. The scraps were collected and returned to the VFW hall to be burned according to protocol.

In Wichita, our women volunteers enjoyed placing each star into a small plastic bag along with the following statement typed on the paper cut-out.

"I am part of our American flag that has flown over the USA. I can no longer fly. The sun and winds have caused me to be tattered and torn. Please carry me as a reminder that YOU are not forgotten."

These small pocket statements were made to be given to veterans to carry in their wallets.

Each participant was given 10 stars to take home to give to veterans or active service members in their hometowns. This is a wonderful activity that may be done at any time by any ability level. July 14-16, 2020 Phoenix, AZ


